Long-term outcomes: Do grammar schools make a difference, part 2

In this blogpost, I looked at the long-term outcomes for pupils who attended grammar schools compared to similar pupils who attended schools in non-selective local authorities.

I then compared the long-term outcomes of pupils who went to school in selective areas but who did not attend grammar schools to those of pupils who went to school in non-selective local authorities.

In that blogpost, I used the cohort which turned 16 in the 2008/09 academic year.

I've now repeated the analysis for the cohort which turned 16 in 2004/05, with the results shown below. The results are much the same. There is a slight advantage in terms of educational outcomes to attending grammar school but there doesn't seem to be much of an earnings differential, particularly when compared to pupils who attended schools with similar (low) rates of free school meals eligibility.
